

Special things to remember:

- All students in the graduation ceremony will dress alike. The only ornamentation allowed will be class stoles, medals and honor cords officially issued by W.F. West High School, <u>Students may not wear or carry flowers!</u> If your student receives flowers, they will be left in the dressing area and it may be difficult to retrieve them in the after-graduation confusion. No decorating of hats allowed!
- All seniors are expected to behave in a courteous and proper fashion as usual. Proper dress is required (long pants for the boys). Please check with Mrs. Williams or Mr. Walters if you have any questions. All rules and regulations for attendance at this school apply through the graduation ceremony. Please make every effort to positively maintain your, and the school's reputation. Any drinking of alcoholic beverages or use of illegal drugs will result in suspension from all activities, school, and Commencement.
- There are no reserved seats for graduation, we will have a large section of chairs on the track for relatives that are handicapped, or incapable of sitting in the stadium bleachers. Please call the main office for more information: 360-807-7235.
- Graduation will be in Bearcat Stadium. At this time we are not limiting the number of guests per student. If we have extreme weather conditions we may need to move into the gym. The commons will be open for viewing of the graduation ceremony through the live streaming option.
- Stadium seating is available on a first come basis. We ask that you are seated at least 5 minutes before the start of the graduation ceremony. PLEASE NOTE that no one will be allowed entrance into the stadium while the students are processing to their seats.Graduation will start promptly at 6:00pm.
- Reminder to all families attending graduation: this ceremony is a very special time for our seniors, their families and our community. We realize that this is a time for personal celebration, but we ask that your celebrating not take away from the enjoyment of this dignified and special occasion. We ask that you wait until after the ceremony to "celebrate". Noise-making instruments such as air horns are **not allowed**. Thank you for your cooperation in making this one of the best graduation ceremonies in Lewis County.
- Senior Skip Day does not exist, and should such an event occur, all involved will be treated as truants and Senior Week Activities will be eliminated for those students.
- Remember that since other students and teachers will be in class the days of June 12-16, we would appreciate seniors not returning to campus during this time. If you need to come back for business purposes, please check in through the office.

Two similar camps will be offered from:


- July 24 29 at WSU in Pullman

Career & College Readiness Juniors Class of 2024!

- SAT/ACT: Since COVID, many colleges have adjusted their policy as it relates to the SAT/ACT test. Some colleges and universities have announced that they will continue to be either Test Optional or Test Blind, it really depends on the college or university you are considering. Depending on their plan, students may want to start preparing to take either SAT and/or the ACT test to ensure they have all options available in the future. Colleges will have their test policy clearly stated on their website, but if you have questions please see Mrs. Chaput.
- **COLLEGE TOURS:** Spring and summer are a great time to start exploring college campuses. There is nothing that compares to actually seeing the campus in person. Tour dates are readily available on each school's website, but if visiting in person is not easily accessible, don't worry! Colleges and universities also offer online tours and information sessions.
- MILITARY ACADEMIES: (West Point, U.S. Naval Academy, Air Force Academy, Coast Guard Academy): If this is something your student is interested in, you need to start this process now. They have detailed steps on their websites and information on timelines are also available in our office
- **JUNIOR MEETING:** We will be having a meeting on June 6th to review the timeframe and what to expect in your senior year! It will move fast,, so hope that students can attend. This meeting will be on **June 6th during CCR Block in the Library.**



<u>Advanced English Program</u>

Dear Students and Parents:

We expect every student in the Advanced English Program at W. F. West to be an avid reader, and we feel that it is our responsibility to recommend literature that will help prepare you for the type of reading that the advanced classes require. Therefore, **incoming advanced sophomore students** in our advanced program are required to read a minimum of two novels from our list each summer and complete a short form for each novel. In addition, **incoming advanced freshmen students** are required to to read a minimum of one novel from our list and complete a short form as well.

Our summer reading rationale:

- ★ Academically and intellectually, supplementary reading is one of the most beneficial activities for students who plan to attend college. We believe that students cannot read too much literature.
- ★ College students who were W. F. West graduates make a point to return and tell us that we are doing an excellent job of teaching them how to analyze and explore literature in-depth, thus preparing them for the collegiate level.
- ★ In our continuing attempt to provide an education competitive with the best public and private schools in the state, we have recognized that our students need to be more well-read. Most Advanced English programs at public and private schools in Washington require summer reading.
- ★ To acquire your chosen novels, you may either use the W. F. West High School Library, or buy them at a bookstore. We send a copy of the reading list to the libraries and the local bookstore.

Parents, please note that some of these novels may contain mature subject matter, and you may want to discuss with your son/daughter your feelings on appropriate reading material. If you would like further information on these authors and novels, the public library has many resources, reviews, and biographies. Please take time to discuss with your child the importance of being well versed in literature. We appreciate your support.
